Lent Greeting from Bishop Suarez



Dear friends in Christ in the Florida-Bahamas Synod,

On Ash Wednesday, as we once again enter into the season of Lent and focus on Jesus' journey to the cross, we do what we've done before. We reflect. We repent. We re-affirm God's passionate love for the world through our words and actions. Just like doing something special for a loved one even though we've done it before, Lent offers us a season to repeat and reflect on truths we've heard before. But, though the messages may be familiar, the lessons and transformations are new each year. What this story does to us each time we hear it is different. Where Christ shows up in the world each time we share it is different.

We use repetition to teach our children...and to learn ourselves. We use repetition to tend to, restore, and strengthen relationships. We are people who learn through repetition. And when we model again a season of prayer, contemplation and service, our children learn (and we learn too) that there is something important about repenting...again and again. There is something important about praying...again and again.

In the season of Lent (and throughout the year), we are invited to reflect again and again on what Jesus did on the cross. We tell this story so our children will learn it. We tell it over and over so that we internalize it, and remember that Jesus was passionate about his love for us. Lent leads us to the "Passion story." And what he did during his three years of ministry—he was passionate about that, too.

We learn something different each time we live these 40 days.

This year, instead of giving up something...what might we repeat and reflect on that will make a difference? Could we repeat a trip to the grocery store and buy an extra bag of groceries for our local food pantry? Could we repeat a phone call and check in on a friend or loved one again? Could we repeat a visit to a local nursing home and visit another resident who doesn't have family close by? Could we take another 10 minutes each day for prayer? And what might we learn from these repetitions that we haven't noticed before? Where do these encounters reveal the passionate love of Christ for us and for the world?

May you, again and again, receive and be transformed by the love of Christ this Lent.

Dear disciples of Jesus:

Sister Joan Chittister is an author and international speaker on subjects of spirituality, peace, religious life, and justice for all people, especially women and the poor. In her book *The Liturgical Year, she writes this of Lent:*

"Lent calls each of us to renew our ongoing commitment to the implications of the Resurrection in our own lives, here and now.

But that demands both the healing of the soul and the honing of the soul, both penance and faith, both a purging of what is superfluous in our lives and the heightening, the intensifying, of what is meaningful."

What a challenge! Find what is meaningful and give away what is superfluous! Especially challenging is the fact that we live surrounded by the superficiality of consumerism. In this world marked by social divisions, we are called to highlight what can be meaningful to unite us as a family of faith.

The temptation of Jesus in the wilderness occurs early in his public ministry. In a sense, Jesus' baptism and temptation become the departure point of his call and ministry. It is fascinating, and quite comforting to realize that Jesus' ministry and the beginning of his pilgrimage began in such raw vulnerability. He persisted in his wandering after God in the face of hunger, the temptation of power and idolatry. Jesus' pilgrimage began in exile. This wandering after God is a paradoxical sort of thing. We know -so well- these places of vulnerability that Jesus experienced in the wilderness. In the same way our Lenten journey should intensify our dependence on God and our commitment to what is really meaningful. The wilderness helped Jesus to intensify his dependence of God and to put his trust and future in the proclamation of what is really meaningful in our life, the wilderness should do the same in us.

Have a blessed Lenten pilgrimage, my sisters and brothers in Christ!

De esta manera sentía que no estaba completamente dejado de lado, sino que simplemente estaba trabajando en condiciones especiales.

Si pensamos en la vida espiritual es igual, hay una batalla interior en cada uno de nosotros, una batalla por estar más cerca de Dios. Y esa batalla ha tenido a lo largo de la historia de la humanidad diferentes desenlaces, algunas veces nos hemos sentido terriblemente malos e incapaces de recibir el amor de Dios y otras veces no hemos creído tan buenos que pensamos que no necesitábamos más de Dios.

LCOS Treasurer's Notes January 2018

January income of \$21,241 for the church includes member giving of \$18,566, transfer and fundraising income of \$2,000, and other income of \$675. Member giving for the month was below our budget of \$21,100, below last January's giving of \$19,493, and below our expenses for the month. Fundraising and Transfers: During the month, we used \$1,800 from the mortgage reduction fund, and \$200 from the Hospitality fund. We had no fundraising income. The other income category of \$675 was 100% rental income, compared to \$0 in the prior year. Expenses for the church were \$23,968 for the month of January, a little less than our budgeted amount of \$24,639 (less-than-expected expenses in stewardship, worship categories) and below last year's expenses of \$25,320. Overall, we recorded a loss for the month of (\$2,727). Financial position: Our December 2017 income was strong. As a result, we were able to start 2018 largely current with our bill payments. We did not enter the year with significant cash reserves, however. January through March tends to be a weaker season in the church's annual income cycle. Keeping up to date with giving over the next two months will help LCOS stay current with the monthly expenses that support our mission and ministries. Also of note, we ended the month of January with less than \$50 in the Mortgage Reduction fund, which could use replenishing.

CHOCOLATE AVOCADO BREAD

This healthier bread is made without eggs, oil, gluten or dairy. Flax seed meal mixed with water is a great egg replacement Avocado is a healthier option instead of oil.

Serves: 8

Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 60 - 70 minutes

Ingredients:

2 tablespoons flax seed meal

¼ cup hot water

1 cup gluten free, all purpose flour

½ cup gluten free oats

½ cup cocoa powder

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon cinnamon

3 ripe bananas

1 ripe avocado

1 cup coconut sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

34 cup non-dairy chocolate chips, divided (Enjoy Life is my favorite)

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. Combine flax seed meal and hot water in a small bowl, set aside.
- 3. Place flour, oats, cocoa powder, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon in a food processor, process on high until fully blended and oats are the consistency of course flour. Transfer to a large mixing bowl.
- 4. Place bananas, avocado, coconut sugar, and vanilla in processor, puree until smooth.
- 5. Add wet ingredients and flax "egg" to dry ingredients, stir until thoroughly combined. Stir in ½ cup chocolate chips and pour batter into a 1 ½ quart loaf pan lined with parchment paper. Sprinkle remaining ¼ cup non-dairy chips on top of batter.
- 6. Bake 60 to 70 minutes until a toothpick inserted in the center of loaf comes out clean. Allow to cool completely before slicing.
