

SERMON

Grace and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus. Amen.

This is our Second Sunday of Advent, the Sunday when we proclaim Peace. Our prayer of the day today says: *strengthen us to serve you with purified lives; through Jesus Christ*. Our prayer reflects clearly the gospel text of this morning, John the Baptist proclaimed *a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins*. These are the good news, good news means *Evangelion*, which means gospel.

These words used to proclaim an imperial victory or the advent of a new Roman emperor (*Good News, Gospel, Evangelion*). But those were imperial good news, those were the gospel of this world. John was proclaiming another kind of good news, another gospel, another Evangelion, the gospel of Jesus Christ.

This is why Mark the evangelist declares:

¹The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; This is just the beginning of the good news, not the imperial good news, not the controlled Roman good news, not the good news of an earthly emperor, but the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

With this simple affirmation the evangelist Mark crashes directly against the Roman machinery, the imperial news media, and declares the real good news, the good news that are not made by the Roman empire. Mark is proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ, the good news that are coming from God. John is a very original messenger, a messenger that proclaims the good news from the wilderness, a preacher that preaches from the margins. John is not proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ from the center of power, he is not preaching inside the temple, neither in a synagogue, nor in the main squares. He is not in the market, not in the amphitheater, not to the teachers of the law, not surrounded by scholars and politicians, no, John is preaching the good news in the wilderness, John is preaching from the margins of society. John is preaching a message that to be heard demands that we move from our comfort zone into a very challenging context. You have to abandon your house and your comfort and go to find the messenger in the wilderness.

But John is also connecting his preaching with the history of Israel. John is preaching from the Jordan banks, from the same place where Elijah disappeared. John is declaring that the ministry of the old prophets is restored again, and God is again speaking to his people.

John doesn't look like a nice guy, his words are strong and judgmental, he is not preaching a light gospel, he is not politically correct, his doesn't look conventional, he is completely the opposite of someone that wants to look acceptable. The Bible says:

⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey.

John preaches in a non-conventional place, an unconventional gospel, and looks and eats like a very strange person. John doesn't fit with the mainstream religious schools of thought and preaching, he is a marginal, he is eccentric, he is not from the mainline Jewish tradition, he is not a Pharisee, he is not a Sadducee, he is a voice preaching good news to all who want to experience authentic repentance and spiritual renewal. I wonder if a congregation today would call a pastor like John the Baptist, a pastor that invites you to worship in the wilderness, a pastor that doesn't look and doesn't preach like a pastor, a pastor that confronts you with a harsh voice and cranky words, a pastor that *clothes with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and eats locusts and wild honey*. He or she definitely will look not only different, but will also make you wonder: how can this be a church? How can this person be a pastor?

Well, those were probably was the same questions that were disturbing the mainstream religious leaders of the established synagogue and the temple. But that was definitely not a problem for the common people. The ordinary people, the people that were waiting for God's word immediately observed John not as an eccentric, but as the voice of Elijah, and the voice of the old prophets that was calling them to remember the source and the ground of their faith: the go back to the wilderness, the go back to God, go back, return. That is exactly the meaning of the word: repentance. Return, comeback, return to God and live again, go back to the living word of God and find the real meaning of faith, hope and love.

And ⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." In other words, John is saying: do you think I am a radical, wait and meet the guy I am preparing the way for. Wait to find the real Messiah, wait and meet Jesus, who won't be just water, but authentic fire. If John looks radical, be ready, said John, the Son of God will be more radical.

John wants repentance preparing the way, Jesus will call to a more radical repentance, one that not only prepares the way, but one that demands that your

whole life become a complete act of living sacrifice and thanksgiving honoring God and serving God with radical gratitude for God's salvation.

John demanded conversion to the kingdom that was coming, Jesus demanded total surrender of our lives to the kingdom and total incarnation of the values of the kingdom in all our life. Not just to prepare the way, Jesus demanded us to be the way, to incarnate the way, to become a living way of life and truth.

We are here to proclaim peace from the wilderness, to announce repentance not only as a preparation, but as a lifestyle. Forgiveness not only for one moment, but forever. And not only a baptism of water, but water that is transformed with the fire of the Spirit.

We are here to proclaim this good news in words and deeds. Luther declared in one of his pastoral writings that we need to follow three fundamental steps in our life with the word of God.

Luther says: first we need to read the scriptures praying (*Oratio*) and learn the meaning of eternal life when we are reading the word of God, because the word is a living word.¹

Aditionally, we need to meditate (*Meditatio*) we need to read, reread and reflect and understand the deep meaning of the word of God. Don't be satisfied with a superficial reading of the word of God, read the word as many times as needed to find its deep meaning and powerful message.

And finally, we need to struggle with the word (*Tentatio*), we need to accept that the word is always confronting us with the power of the voice of God and challenging the world. Luther explains us that our faith is not merely an interior experience but implies also an external confrontation with our culture and values.

The word of God confronts what we have inside us with what we find outside us. This is not only a devotional experience. Struggle (Tentatio) is not a mystic reading, but a confrontation of the world with the message of the word of God.

This is what John proclaimed, a confrontation of the world outside us using the message of the good news. Because the word of God demands loyalty to God and to the truth of Jesus Christ the Son of God. However, that demand many times implies a critic to the culture that surrounds us, because it doesn't reflect the values of the word of God. We need to remember that like John we are here to proclaim the need of permanent repentance, and the grace of God that is always ready to forgive and restore.

God welcomes those who come by way of the baptism of repentance of sin. Only God can accomplish our salvation, the same God that invites us to repent is the same God that creates a way to change and renewal. To come to God in repentance is to move from the complacency and comfort zone where we live to a new life. To be baptized with water and fire is to be baptized to incarnate the gospel in words and deeds. It is a permanent call to the world that the world also needs to repent and to accept the good news of Jesus Christ.

John is inviting us to persevere in our discipleship, to learn and live the word that we read, to meditate and accept the struggle that implies to be a Christian in our world nowadays so that our prayer of the day comes back with the words: *strengthen us to serve you with purified lives; through Jesus Christ.*

It is interesting that the peace of God comes only after we are in peace with God, and to be in peace with God is to be reconciled with God, it is to be back to God and have the fire of the Spirit illuminating our heart and mind.

We are celebrating that we have peace with God, so remember that this peace is the fruit of our return and our reconciliation with God. Jesus is the way, the life and the truth that incarnates this reconciliation and now we are Jesus's messengers of reconciliation, but first we need to remember that it is important to help the people to remember the importance of repentance.

Help your friends and family to go back to Christ and his kingdom at this Christmas time. This is the time to remember that authentic peace requires this return to God, this is the gift of Advent, peace if you return, peace for the journey and peace to be shared with all the world.

Let us move from the center and the comfort zone to the wilderness and the margins, and accept the eccentric messenger of God, John the Baptist, who is inviting us to be ready to celebrate that repentance along the path to permanent peace.

Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.


