Dear disciples of Jesus:

When we start to think that the message of the resurrection has to do a lot with the way we treat others- and especially with how we care for the more vulnerable in our society-, then we can understand how important it is for the message of the resurrection to bring our attention to the way we are building our spiritual life. It is not only good to have our

foundation on Christ's resurrection, but it is also important that what we are building upon this foundation. Only then, we will understand that the resurrection our life should manifest is the resurrection founded on Christ. Christ's example of life should be the expression of what we are building. Christ's life is the life of the resurrection. A life that always reveals the love and grace of God for all, and especially for the excluded, the sick, the widow, the orphan, the marginalized, the poor, and the heart broken.

It is with this understanding of what resurrection means that we can read the Gospel of Easter Sunday and understand the magnitude of our discipleship:

"Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. <sup>7</sup>But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." Mc 16, 6.

The resurrection of Jesus means the excellence of love and the victory of love over death and sin. The resurrection of Jesus is a way of life that is ready to serve, touch, forgive, embrace and give the best from oneself for the best of the ones in need. The resurrection of Jesus is something that is only revealed when we live in relationship, in companionship and in solidarity.

Easter never happens in isolation or separation from the world and the people; the resurrection happens in the opposite way, because we are always connected with how we treat the others and how we love the others. This connection makes the message of the resurrection to invite us to experience wholeness as disciples of Christ. We love and experience the resurrection in a broken world, a world that is imperfect, but that is also redeemed.

Queridos discípulos de Jesús:

Cuando empezamos a pensar que el mensaje de la resurrección tiene mucho que ver con la forma en que tratamos a los demás y especialmente con la forma en que nos preocupamos por los más vulnerables de nuestra sociedad, entonces podemos entender lo importante que es para nosotros el mensaje de la resurrección. Grace be with you Sisters and Brothers in Christ. The days of our Lenten journey have gone by swiftly. Or for some of us, maybe a bit slowly as we continue to navigate the days between now and the days following Easter. Reflecting upon these days, I continue to rise giving thanks for seeing the newness of each day. Days that have brought me the opportunity to be grateful for the understanding that Jesus has done the hard work of showing me the Grace of God's love each day. Let's face it Sisters and Brothers in Christ, this remarkable season of the church, one that mirrors the journey of Jesus, is full of the twists and turns of decisions we have to make to stand before the Cross in humility of the gift of life given to us each day. The world around us, the world we create each day as our home and our places of work, teaching and living out and through God's promise to be always with us requires purposeful thought and action.

## LCOS Treasurer's Report – March 2021

#### Preliminary Monthly Results for February 2021

Church income in February was \$49,231.

- February income included the receipt of our second PPP loan of \$31,500.
- Member giving was \$13,365 for February, below our budget of \$16,400 and last year's giving of \$16,056.
- We used \$2,150 of designated funds during the month, including \$2,000 from the Mortgage Reduction Fund and \$150 from the Memorial Fund.
- We had rental income of \$2,216, vs. \$2,791 in February 2020.

Church **expense** was **\$23,786** in February, below our expense of \$25,582 in February 2020 and our budgeted expense of \$27,795. Most expenses were in line with expectations. The budget for February had included about \$2,500 in Maintenance/Improvements that did not happen during the month.

LCOS had a **net gain** of **\$25,444** for the month. Excluding the PPP loan proceeds, we would have recorded a loss of about \$6,000 for the month.

#### A Few Words: Grants and Thrivent Cards

Our Annual Congregational Report to the ELCA is submitted each year in February, and I noticed this year that the ELCA is asking for more details on any grants the church might have received during the year. In 2020 we received several grants (from the ELCA, from the Synod, and from Walmart). These were all given for the benefit of the Food Bank and our Portico Ministry, and we reported them all to the ELCA.

We also benefited from several \$250 Thrivent Gift Cards in 2020, which are also (essentially) grants. I believe we can do a better job on reporting our use of these gift cards in 2021. If you apply for, and receive, a Thrivent Gift card, please let us know. Please provide the date approved, the stated purpose for the card, and basic information about what was purchased. #### **BANANA PUDDING PARFAITS**

Serves 4 Prep and Cook Time: 1 hour 45 minutes

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup cornstarch
- 2 cups unsweetened, unflavored non-dairy milk
- 4 tablespoons + 2 teaspoons maple syrup
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- $\frac{3}{4}$  cup rolled oats
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> teaspoon ground cinnamon
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup raw unsalted cashews soaked in boiling water for 10 minutes
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup water
- 3 large or 4 small bananas, sliced into <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch rounds

#### DIRECTIONS

- 1. For the pudding, place the cornstarch in a medium saucepan. Gradually whisk in milk until smooth. Whisk in 3 tablespoons maple syrup, nutmeg, and salt. Bring to a boil over medium heat, whisking constantly. Cook and whisk 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture is thickened and no foam remains on the surface. Stir in 1 teaspoon of the vanilla. Transfer to a bowl to cool.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a small bowl stir together the oats, 1 tablespoon maple syrup, ½ teaspoon vanilla, and the cinnamon. Spread mixture in a thin layer on the prepared baking sheet. Bake 15 to 18 minutes until the oats are golden brown, stirring once.
- 3. Drain the cashews. In a blender combine cashew and remaining 2 teaspoons maple syrup and <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> teaspoon vanilla. Add <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup water, cover and blend until smooth and creamy. Place in an airtight container and chill.
- 4. To assemble, spoon 2 tablespoons pudding in each of four parfait glasses. Top with 1/3 of the banana slices and 1/3 of the oat mixture. Repeat with another layer of pudding, 1/3 of the bananas and 1/3 of the oat mixture. Layer with the remaining banana slices and pudding. Cover and chill 1 to 8 hours.
- 5. Just before serving, if desired, top with additional banana slices and the remaining oat mixture. Top each parfait with 1 tablespoon cashew cream and additional cinnamon.
