Dear disciples of Jesus:

Advent and Christmas Seasons are here. The good news is that the incarnation took place in a concrete moment of history and opened the door to a new spirituality and as well represented a message to the common people, to the ones that were and are vulnerable people.

The incarnation is a challenge to our logic and to our ideas of what should happen. The incarnation is an invitation to see God in a baby in a manger.

That breaks all reason and logic. The older philosophers expressed that the limited is not capable to content the infinite. For a non-believer's point of view what is infinite cannot be incarnated in a limited human body. For that reason, many people deny the incarnation and the meaning of Christmas. Because on *this view, one marginal baby born in the first century in a poor province of the Roman Empire could not possibly be the full and complete revelation of God.*

But we challenge that logic and make a faith statement today, confessing that we believe in the message of the angels and the celestial celebration that said: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord.

Yes, this is the miracle and the wonder of Christmas. The good news that the infinite and eternal God is revealed in the finite and limited human existence. A baby in a manger is the incarnate God and is the gift to the world!

This is a gift that can be received independently of our social status, age, race, gender, etc. The baby in the manger is a gift that can be received always. You only need to open your heart to receive it. There is no exclusion, there are not requirements, there is only grace, incarnated grace in history. Grace as a powerful spiritual transformation and grace open to all the people. Grace with the power to transform people, grace that is redemptive love, grace that is forgiveness of sins, grace that is reconciliation with your enemy, grace that is unlimited, grace that is extravagant, grace that is here for you.

God's incarnation is a gift for you! Have a blessed Advent and Christmas Season.

Reformation yesterday and today.

Martin Luther was a catholic monk. One who was an applied student of the word of God. Yet also one who questioned the dogmatic and flawed institution of the Roman Catholic Church. A rebellious, brave and principled man who opened the door to a new manner of Christian faith. Rather than the hierarchy where every soul was at the bottom of the pyramid and at the mercy of a pope and a priest. Luther allowed everybody to know that a personal relationship with God is possible. No need for intermediaries. His greatest manifestation of faith were the 95 theses where he outlined his differences with the corruption of the established church. He suffered persecution because of his deeds. And in such he showed the nexus between Jesus' way of the cross and the tribulations any believer no matter how humble or imperfect must face.

The Lord says "I will put my law within them, I will write it on their hearts...no longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the Lord' for they shall all know me, from the least to the greatest" Jer 31. This is a powerful line that embodies Luther's struggle during the days of the reformation. Just like Jeremiah writes, there is no reason to be blocked from the knowledge of God, because God is already within us. God is present in our hearts; we are his people. It is also important to note the last line of Jeremiah: "for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more".

The church of Luther's time was one of guilt. This was because they professed the message that you were a bad, sinful being. This message was then used to manipulate the masses into keeping the imperial church hierarchy in dominant position, while at the same time doing great harm to one's soul. This is because this type of message distanced one from the love of Christ. Let's remember that in those times, access to scripture was only for the church hierarchy. This means that the message of hope and forgiveness from God and Christ would not be heard as much. Luther allowed the Bible to be accessed in all languages, his translation into German allowed his country to know the forgiveness of sins. For example, Psalm 46 says that "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in all trouble." This psalm is present in Luther's life in the anthem of Lutheranism *A Mighty Fortress is Our God*. Like Psalm 46 mentions of God being our stronghold, that nations may rage, but when God speaks, the earth melts away. This signifies that God in the end is in control. In *A Mighty Fortress* Luther outline how our ancient foe's craft, power and cruel hate are great. That on earth there is not a match for the Prince of Darkness. However, we should not tremble, because we can endure, and it's his doom that's sure with Christ Jesus and God's will to triumph through us. That is the power of the forgiveness of Christ, that is the power of the triumph of the reformation at work. We learn that no matter the difficulties we may face in our lives, the night eventually ends. We must have faith and trust, that God can lend us a hand if we repent, amend and most of all believe.

Atonement is an essential subject of the reformation and the message of Christ. In Romans Paul declared that "no human being will be justified in his sight by deeds prescribed by law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin". While this may sound draconian, that is not the end of it. We see the spirit of the Reformation at work in the next lines of the same passage: "since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption of Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood effective through faith". Those are two pillars to count in: faith and atonement. To fix, restitute whatever destruction we may have caused, we are deserving of a new opportunity because of the grace of Christ. Luther beautifully referenced this as us humans being sinners and saints. Sinners since we are capable of vast error, yet saints because we are capable of great good. We should not bash ourselves or one another with perennial negativity as we see in society or as the pre-reformation church manifested. Rather we should be aware that thanks to Christ's salvation we can amend our errors and pass as something good. One recent example of such redemption was seen last year in a man named George Floyd. George during his lifetime was reported to have made several errors. Such as drug addiction, harassment, and theft. However, in his funeral you could see the affection that all his family members had for him. Because despite all his mistakes they loved him, and they had gratitude for what he did for each of them. Most important of all, he became a worldwide symbol for justice and persistence against oppression, leaving a legacy of awareness and reflection.

One other great example is Emperor Constantine. While legalizing and popularizing Christianity, he also tried to tame it. He at times sinned of using Christ's image for his own personal glory. While throughout his lifetime he worshipped many idols, in the very end of his life he had to humble himself, submit and repent. He converted to Christianity because perhaps deep inside that all powerful man in the end knew of all his shortcomings and of the power of forgiveness from God.

Lastly, the message of the Gospel of John mentions how knowing the truth makes you free. If you can recall previous sermons, my father referenced how we should not live in denial. Because if we dedicate ourselves to sweeping things under the rug, in the end the dirt does not go away, and we deceive ourselves. It is better to recognize things and try to fix them, that's what grace is for and to not live in error since in the long run that will bite back. As the gospel says "everyone who commits a sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. So, if the son makes you free, you will be free indeed". An example that can be seen in a tragic manner is in *The Godfather* movie trilogy. The character of Michael Corleone is one of noble intentions in his youth. A smart young man with ambitions, caring for his people who wishes a life beyond what surrounded his mafia family. However, because of the attempt on the life of his father Vito, he became involved in a crime that he then was forced to escape from. Resulting from getting his hands dirty from what at first was self-defense action resulted next in the corruption of his soul. He became the boss of his family's criminal empire, guided by the sense of responsibility he felt to protect those he cared about. However, in that path he then killed his brother out of revenge and pride. He murdered many of his rivals which led to estranging himself from his wife and family, the very people he swore to protect. Rather than fixing his errors he fell deeper into it, becoming an angry, paranoid, and scary man because of the deep remorse he buried within. This sequence is best embodied when he confesses with a priest in the last movie. He is seen as a frail man. And eventually all that guilt he kept in denial and under the rug exploded when his errors came back to bite him. The scene where his daughter is killed right in front of him, all his lifelong mistakes came full circle.

Keeping this in mind, when we see our neighbors, relatives, or our siblings in Christ we should not persist with them in the darkness. Just like the Reformation brought light unto what was wrong in the corrupt institutions of religion, that same way Luther calls us in our daily lives to bring our humble beam of light to illumine the darkness. Because united as Christians and as Lutherans we bring light to the world. It is not too late, whether you are young or old. Whether you are timid or outgoing, you have that capacity to help your neighbor and our planet. It is our responsibility in stewardship as Christians to look out for all that is living. That is your call to action, our call to action as Lutherans!

As a Lutheran church throughout our history, we have faced many struggles, plenty of internal divisions. Here in America we have seen the fragmentation and at times animosity between different synods like the ELCA, Missouri, Wisconsin and so on. In my native country of Peru, we have faced difficult times too. Our synod known as ILEP that took so much energy to build has dismembered. Due to several internal conflicts, lack of cooperation. This was a synod that did great work in building churches in the poorest neighborhoods where all you found was dirt. But block, by block, and with the combined energies of many no matter their backgrounds, churches were built. A robust nationwide synod was constructed. One that then sent its own students and pastors to work abroad to continue building their skills. That is who we are. We are workers, fighters and we act humbly and united, we accomplish great things in Christ. We see it for instance in the work that is done in the foodbank.

But let us not forget our greatness and importance. We should unite in what was the original concept of the Reformation. We are Lutherans, the mothers, and fathers of what else came afterwards. We are the originators and the reason why now many more denominations and people can grow freely and find their own way and connection with God. We are brave, let's never be afraid. One of my favorite verses of all time is, "Let goods and kindred go, this mortal life also; the body they may kill; God's truth abideth still; his kingdom is forever".

What matters in this life is not what you had nor the pain you encountered, but what you did and who you did it for.

Be proud of being Lutheran! Be proud of being in the ELCA. Be proud of our history, your history, of what makes us great. Like former bishop Mark Hanson once told me and many tens of thousands of Lutherans during the ELCA Youth Gathering: Let us stand up and break the walls that divide us! Let's break the walls and unite to build bridges of love!" Let's live God's love in the world! Here we stand! With God's work and our hands always present.



LCOS Treasurer's Report - November 2021

<u>Preliminary Results – October</u>

Church income in October was \$24,939.

- Member giving was \$16,588 for October, compared to our budget of \$17,400 and last year's giving of \$15,730.
- We used \$5,450 in designated funds during the month, including \$3,000 from the Mortgage Reduction fund, \$2,200 from the Fellowship Fund, and \$250 from Bold Statement (phone fund).
- Our fundraiser (Mary K's sale) raised \$1,035 in funds for the church.
- Rental/Other income was \$1,866 in October, vs. \$1,991 last year.

Church **expense** was **\$25,157** in October, vs. \$24,146 a year ago and our budget of \$27,229.

- Facilities costs were about \$2,400 lower last year. In 2020, we had prepaid our property/casualty insurance policy, which reduced monthly expense by almost \$1,800.
- Other expense items were roughly in line with last year's levels.

LCOS had a **net loss** of (\$218) for the month.

Food Bank Thanksgiving Food Distribution

















BULGUR PILAF

Serves: 4-6

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 40 minutes

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup onion diced

2 cups low sodium vegetable broth

½ cup apple cider vinegar

½ cup uncooked rice

8 ounces mushrooms, sliced

½ cup uncooked bulgur wheat

½ cup green bell pepper, chopped

½ cup red bell pepper, chopped

1 tablespoon coconut aminos, low sodium soy sauce or tamari

½ teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

Freshly ground pepper

½ cup Cilantro, chopped

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Sauté the onion in a hot skillet until the onion turns golden.
- 2. Add the broth, apple cider vinegar and rice. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover, and cook for 10 minutes.
- 3. Add the mushrooms, bulgur, peppers, soy sauce, crushed red pepper and freshly ground black pepper. Mix well, cover, and continue to cook an additional 20 minutes until grains are tender and most of the liquid is absorbed.
- 4. Adjust seasonings and stir in cilantro.
- 5. Serve warm.
