Christmas is an Antidote for our Fears

Fear seems to pervade our contemporary lives. We fear life and death, and everything in between. We fear loss of income and job, we fear immigration and terrorism, we fear cancer and dementia, global warming and an uncertain, unknown future.

The antidote to our fears is found in the coming of Christ into the world. When fear becomes our orientation to the world, we either withdraw into isolation or resort to acts of aggression. Fear hardens lives and closes borders. Fear prevents us from being open to the radial newness of God's promises.

If fear closes us off from hearing God's word of promise, it is no wonder that God had to send messengers to announce, "Do not be afraid."

Has it ever occurred to you how often those words appear in the Christmas story? Gabriel has already spoken them to Zachariah, father-to-be of John the Baptist. "Be not afraid." He has spoken those words to Joseph as Joseph contemplates ending his engagement with Mary. "Don't be afraid." To the startled shepherds in the fields keeping watch over their flocks by night, the angel says, "Fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be for all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

Isaiah offers a promise of homecoming from exile. To people who felt that God had failed to keep promises or had abandon them, God sent this messenger to say -


**The people who walked in darkness

Opening prayer at 11:00am

- Financial- LCOS had steady income reported last month. Was able to make a \$3000.00 payment toward principle of the mortgage with a balance of \$130,600.00 remaining. Strong facilities income due to rentals of Luther Hall and Golf Fundraiser reported \$13,475.00.
- Kaye Prox Food Bank- continues to serve 350+ families weekly. Continue to serve Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Donations accepted of canned items, dry goods and personal care items. Plan to give Thanksgiving meal kits and small Christmas gifts this year.
- Technology- continuing to get council members connected to Share Point for document sharing. Continuing to work on the updating of the audio equipment in the church. Updating the email list of the church. If you have received an email please respond so that we know that your email is current. Prayer list has been updated by Deacon Steve.
- Facilities and Grounds- Fence in back of the property has been installed, costs deferred by donations. Plan for flower bed in front of church to be cleaned up, higher toilets will be installed in the women's bathroom. Knox box to be installed by the front entrance of the church for access by the fire department in event of an emergency. New copier to be delivered.
- Outreach- Submit a picture of the Nativity set displayed in your home to be placed on a Christmas tree at church. Send pictures to Sharon Rozell and she will get them printed. Planning Advent activities.
- Deacon Einstein Gonzalez on campus usually days of Food Bank distribution to get to know the Latino clients. Plan to have prayer sessions on Wednesday if clients are interested. He continues to gather information about the Latino influence in the Town and Country area.
- LAFFS plans their Christmas Brunch and gift exchange Saturday, December 13, 2025. We will be meeting 11:30am at the home of Jan Spaulding. You do not have to be a member of LAFFS to attend this fun event filled with food and laughter. Please join us!!!!

LCOS Treasurer's Report—October 2025

October Financial Review:

Church **income** in October was **\$40,678**, above our budget of \$21,969 and last year's result of \$18,539.

Member Giving was \$15,531, above our budget of \$14,619 and year-ago gifts of \$14,067.

Fundraising: the Golf tournament raised a total of \$17,110 before expenses of \$3,685. We donated 20% (\$2,865) of the net proceeds of \$13,425 to our feeding ministries, which leaves \$10,560 for use by the church in our General Fund. J

Designated Funds: during October we used \$3,960 in Bold Statement Funds toward the new fence, and \$200 from the Music/Choir Fund for new microphones/sound equipment.

Facilities income was \$3,877 in October, vs. \$2,472 a year ago.

Church **expense** was **\$30,990** in October, vs. \$19,627 a year ago and our budget of \$21,785.

The Golf Tournament contributed \$3,685 in fundraising expense and \$2,865 in Mission Expense in October. (It was in November, in both 2024 and in our 2025 budget.)

We set aside an additional \$1,500 in October toward future pastoral compensation costs. The Pastoral Compensation Fund now has a balance of \$17,500. These funds can be used toward our upcoming call process and/or future compensation of a Pastor.

A new fence at the back of the property, and the installation of a Knox box (key box for first responders) contributed to higher-than-expected facilities costs.

All other expense categories were in line with expectations.

LCOS recorded **net income** of **\$9,688** in October.

Facility and Grounds

We can take one more project off our to-do list: the back fence is complete! From now through Spring we can focus on getting Bougainvillea plants planted. The color of the plant is San Diego Red, but most plants at Home Depot do not give a color name. Just remember it is not a pink-red, but an orange-red. This will take a little time to find and plant all these, my best guess is we need 50 plants, if planted 4 ft apart, but it should be beautiful when finished and in bloom! (any available Thrivent cards??)

I've used this space the past few months to give a little history of items you see in church every Sunday, but you might like to know why. This time we'll look at the Liturgical Appointments which are primarily in the Chancel area (altar). That area changes frequently for seasons, holidays, etc. but some items are there because they MUST be there. We covered the paraments and their color changes, but the must haves are a cross, the service book, (or missal) on its stand and at least two candles, plus the sanctuary candle.

Most important is the cross, of which we use two. One is the processional cross carried in for each service and the large one on the wall, since we have a free-standing altar. Our processional cross is a crucifix cross, emphasizing the incarnation of Christ and His atoning sacrifice. Notice the service book sits off to the side allowing the communion elements to be placed in the center. Candles, like crosses have a long history in the church. Early churches would have had oil lamps, until about the 12th century. Even after light bulbs came about candles have been a Christian symbol of the statement of Jesus "I am the light of the world". The two candles at the altar are called eucharistic lights because service is Holy Communion. The sanctuary candle is hung on a side chancel wall or from the ceiling and usually has a clear or red glass globe.

And thus we say goodbye to 2025 and welcome in 2026! There will be many exciting things happening this year! Gathering a Call Committee to begin looking for a pastor, getting projects finished so we look good and put our best foot forward, as the saying goes! I will add to that list as I am stepping down from the many things/projects/committees/etc. that I currently am involved in. In many ways these things have been interesting, rewarding, and a learning process for sure, but I have been involved in some project since I joined LCOS, FORTY years ago! Think it is time for me to do my projects! Like clean up from last years hurricane! (My list is long!) I might get my to-do list finished (ha ha) and get bored and come looking for something to do, as I well know there is always a project here! Many thanks to all who have assisted over the years. I certainly didn't go it alone!

Most of the food we distribute is sourced via our partnership with Feeding Tampa Bay. We order bulk produce and non-perishables from Feeding Tampa Bay weekly, at no charge or at discounted rate. Feeding Tampa Bay also pairs us with local retailers, including Walmart Neighborhood Markets, Publix stores, Target stores, and Aldi locations, all of which donate to us each week.

Thanks, and so much love, to our sister churches:

- First Reformed Church of Tampa provides devotionals for us to hand out, regularly provides us food and financial donations, and hosts the Portico Ministry on their campus.
- Incarnation Catholic Church donates food every month. Many of our food bank and Portico volunteers are ICC members. The ICC Columbiettes provide non-food donations (blankets, socks, clothes) to the Portico Ministry.
- Messiah Lutheran Church has long provided us financial donations and connected us with school food drives. In 2025, they have delivered monthly food donations, and their volunteers join us weekly.
- Grace Lutheran Church includes us in their food drives, and Atonement Lutheran Church donated our cargo van, which has served us all through 2025!



Thanks to Village Inn and Bravo: Village Inn continues to offer regular financial support. We bring your dining receipts into the restaurant, and Village Inn gives back to the food bank a percentage of each bill. 

Portico Ministry

Brothers and Sisters:

As we move into the winter and holiday season, we're beginning to see new faces looking for a warm meal. This is a trend I've noticed since volunteering to feed and provide meals, clothing and personal hygiene products to our houseless neighbors. During the summer days we normally hand out 25 meals, but most recently that number's gone up to 28-30, having to supplement with day bags prepared and provided by the food bank, so we don't have to turn anyone away without something to eat.

Our partner and friend Juan De La Cruz identifies the mission to feed the homeless under the Apostleship name of Five Breads and Two Fishes and is organizing a Christmas luncheon event to be held at Incarnation Church, in the Saint Mark's Hall, on Saturday December 27 10:00 to 1:00. He looks forward preparing turkey, mashed potatoes, mac and cheese, salad, coffee or hot cocoa, juice, water and dessert. Further, he would like to secure items, *used but not abused, new is okay*, such as shoes, jackets, pants, socks, gloves, hats and hygiene items such as toothbrushes, paste, deodorant, soap bars, sanitizers, etc. He served just over 30 meals last year and expects the number to increase and fall between 35-40 this year.

This is where I would like to reach out to our LCOS members to once again dig into your closet and identify an item you may be willing to part ways with and donate it for a good cause. The items donated will be bagged by gender and offered as a Christmas gift.


If you are willing, another option may be to donate a food item(s) identified in the "menu" to be served in the day of the event or you may donate a \$5 dollar gift card from McDonalds or Burger King. Regardless of what the donation may be, your effort is appreciated, and we thank God for it.

Moving into the New Year, the Ministry will be exploring the possibility of increasing the number of meals provided by Bravo Supermarket from 25 to 30 so we may continue meeting the needs of our houseless neighbors.

"Heavenly Father, we pray for those who face the harsh winter without a home. Provide them with shelter, warmth, and safety. Stir our hearts to support local shelters, donate what we can, and volunteer our time. May we be Your hands and feet in serving the vulnerable and ensure no one is left cold and alone this season. Amen."

That same Sunday the Choir will sing a Christmas Cantata during the service, and we will share our traditional Christmas Dinner in Luther Hall. A holiday craft project is also being planned.


